### The Fight Will Come Off.

DALLAS, Tex., Aug. 1.—Ex-City Judge Charles Fecklor, regarded as one of the clearest legal minds in Dallas, stated the law governing prize-fighting as follows:

"The last legislature adopted a new criminal code which made prize-fighting a misdemeanor, punishable with a fine of not less than \$500 or more than \$1000, and an imprisonment of 30 days. This law went into operation July 20. The legislature also subsequently passed a civil code and it enacted that a fight may take place by taking out a license for \$500. This law goes into effect September 1. The civil code was adopted last and therefore will take precedence over the other."

This opinion is concurred in by every lawyer in Dallas, who has read the law, and there is no power to prevent the Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight.—Sun.

The following appears in the Statesman of August the 3rd.

"A stage driver who has just reached South Dakota Springs says he left Cariboo this morning. He came through the Gray's Lake and Soda Springs country and reports 200 Bannocks were at Gray's Lake on their way from Jackson's Hole to the reservation. They say there

has been no fighting and no desire to fight on their part. The scare seems to be over and settlers understand the Indians are trying to make their way back to the reservation to avoid the troops. The information is thoroughly reliable."

### Digest of Land and Mining Decisions.

Town lots may be taken either for business or residence purposes, and it is not a material fact that the claimant owns other lots and intends use of them together as a homestead and is using the lots as a garden.

Aluminum is not such a mineral as will except the land containing it from settlement and entry as agricultural land, or warrant the allowance of a mineral entry thereof.

In giving notice of application the required period of time must be covered by each form of notice.

An application for patent or the survey of a claim may embrace several contiguous locations. The survey should exhibit the boundaries and conflicts of each location of the consolidated claim.
