TOOK HIS OWN LIFE.

S. H. Foreman Shot Himself Twice, in his Room at the French Hotel, Last Thursday Morning.

Citizens standing near and pass-
ing the French Hotel, in this place,
last Thursday morning about 8
o'clock, as well as persons in the
building were startled by two gun
shots the sound coming from one of
the rooms upstairs. Investigation
proved it to be the room occupied
by S. H. Foreman a life insurance
agent and also representing the
Blue Mountain Telephone company,
and a resident of Pendleton, with a
wife and one child. Mr. Foreman
had taken his life by firing two
pistol balls through his body, one
passing through his heart the other
just below.

Atty. John W. Biggs was the first
to reach the suicide but too late to
accomplish any good, as Mr. Fore-
man never spoke after Mr. Biggs
reached him. Dr. Marsden was
immediately called but could do
nothing the man being dead before
the Dr. reached the room, as he only
lived about ten minutes after firing
the shots.

The coroner summoned a jury
and the jury returned a verdict of
suicide. Mr. Foreman was univer-
sally liked here, and his taking
his own life was quite a shock to
our citizens, but since his death we
hear that he expected to take his
own life but as usual in such cases
little attention was paid to what he
said on that subject. He was a
free mason and his body was cared
for by the lodge of free masons in
this place and his remains taken
to his home in Pendleton for buri-
al.

Those here, who were most inti-
mate with Foreman, are satisfied
he had troubles of a private nature,
which caused him to commit the
rash act that ended his existence.
Be that as it may he has crossed
the river and his troubles in this
world are over.
