The Burns Jockey Club will give three days racing, August 28, 29, 30 and 31, 1895.

FIRST DAY, AUG. 28.

1st. 1/4 mile dash, free for all, \$100

2d. 1/2 mile dash for Harney county horses, 25 class, purse 75

SECOND DAY, AUG. 29.

1st. 1/4 mile dash, free for all, 150

2d. 1/2 mile dash, free for all, 150

THIRD DAY, AUG. 30.

1st. 1/4 mile dash, free for all, 150

2d. 600 yards dash, for Harney county horses that never ran for public money, purse 50

FOURTH DAY, AUG. 31.

1st. 1/4 mile and repeat, two in three, free for all, purse 175

2d. 1 mile dash for Indian horses, Indian riders, entrance fee, purse 15

Ten per cent entrance fee required in all races. Entries to be made with the secretary on or before 8 o'clock the evening before each race. Five horses to enter and three to start in all races. First horse 75 per cent of purse, second horse 25 per cent. The races to be governed by the Blood Horse Association Rules.

THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oregon, offers free tuition to all students. Young men can obtain board, lodging, heat and light in the dormitory for \$2.50 per week. Roomers furnish their own linen. Young women are provided with board in private families at \$3.00 per week. Young women desiring board should address Prof. John Straun, Eugene, Oregon; or Secretary Young Woman's Christian Association, Eugene. The University offers three baccalaureate degrees, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Letters with corresponding courses of study. The following shorter courses are also offered:—An English course leading in two years to a business diploma and in three years to the title graduate in English; An advanced course for graduates of normal schools leading to the degree master of pedagogy; A three years' course in civil engineering leading to the degree civil engineer; A course of two years for teachers of physical education leading to a diploma and the title director of physical education. The University charges an incidental fee of ten dollars which is payable in advance by all students. Students holding diplomas from the public schools and those having teachers' certificates are admitted to the preparatory department without examination. Those desiring information regarding the preparatory department should address the Dean, N. I. Narregran, Eugene. For catalogues and information address C. H. Chapman, President, or J. J.
