A MILLIONAIRE SUED.

Mrs. Crandall Root, a boarding house keeper of Colorado Springs, filed suit against W. S. Stratton, the millionaire mine owner, for breach of promise on May 30. She alleged in her complaint that she had been induced to yield to the solicitations of Stratton at a time before he was known in the world of finance and had nothing but his small wages as a carpenter to support him.

Mrs. Root has a boy 10 years old, but at the time of the alleged offense she was a widow. The case is now pending in the District Court, but her attorneys say she has a good case and that they will be able to substantiate all claims when it comes to trial, with letters from Stratton. The suit is for \$200,000. Stratton is reputed to be worth from \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000, accumulated in the past three years. Shortly after the filing of the suit Stratton ordered work suspended on several of his properties, so as to limit the output to \$100,000 a month; but he does not seem capable of restricting the growth of his fortune, for no later than last week miners in the Independence struck a four foot vein that runs \$120,000 to the ton, or the richest pay streak ever struck in the world.

Stratton is quiet in his habits. All his money so far has gone back into the ground for the development of his properties and the purchase of others.

His most sensational effort was shipping a train load of ore to the smelters at Denver that netted him a million dollars. Mrs. Root is a handsome, buxom lady in the vicinity of 40.

Young Gresham Eloped.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12—A Herald special from Washington says: Samuel H. Gresham, a nephew of the late Secretary of State, and a prominent business man of Norfolk, Va., and Miss Sarah Kobbe, a daughter of Captain William A. Kobbe of the Third United States Artillery, eloped from the Hygeia Hotel, Old Point Comfort, last evening, and were married in this city this afternoon. The wedding took place at the Hotel Oxford, where the eloping couple registered after their arrival in the city.

Miss Kobbe and Mr. Gresham arrived in Washington on the steamer Washington at 7 a m yesterday. The morning was spent in driving about the city, and about 1 o'clock Miss Kobbe and a woman friend drove to the Oxford and asked the clerk to assign them a room. Miss Kobbe said she intended to get married at the hotel, and registered under the name of Mrs. T. F. Gage of New York. She then asked that a police magistrate be sent for so that the marriage ceremony might be performed. It was found, however, that the district magistrates have not the power to marry. The Rev. Dr. York was asked to perform the ceremony and

he assented. The couple went to the City Hall and obtained a license under their correct names, but giving Washington as their place of residence. The marriage ceremony was then performed.

Maryland Populist.

BALTIMORE, Aug. 21—The populists held their state convention here today. Resolutions were reported indorsing the Omaha platform, declaring against free silver, in favor of reform in the oyster laws, etc. Editor Dunning, of the Watchman, opposed the declaration against free silver, but was voted down by a large majority and the resolutions were adopted. The following were nominated: Governor, H. T. Andrews; attorney general, H. W. Monett; comptroller, G. S. Hobson.

Colorado Bull Fight.

CRIPPLE CREEK, Colo., Aug. 21—Every available space throughout the district is covered with glowing posters announcing the coming bull fight at Gillette. Sixty carpenters are putting the finishing touches on the big bull ring. The troupe of Mexican bull fighters arrived last night and others will be on hand by Saturday. J. H. Wolfe, the projector of the fight, says: "We have already sold over 5000 tickets and do not believe 100 of them went into the hands of minors. I have seen Governor McIntyre and the sheriff of this county and believe that both are convinced that nothing of a cruel nature will be displayed in the arena."
