—E. Brown and wife, of Diamond, are stopping in town so that their little child can be under the care of the doctor here.

—W. A. Imes, D. S. C. of the Knights of the Maccabees, a fraternal and beneficiary order, is in our town and will organize a subordinate Tent of the order here.

—The receiver in the case of Peter Kuhl vs. J. Durkheimer et al's debt, has been ordered by Judge Clifford, to return the stock now in his possession to its usual range, pending further orders of the court.

—R. J. and N. T. Baker, of Silver Creek, desire to let 3000 head of sheep on the shares, 200 ewes and the balance lambs. Parties wanting an investment of the kind can go and see the gentlemen at their home on Silver Creek or address them at Riley P. O.

—There will be from three to five hundred of thoroughbred and high grade Spanish merino bucks in this county in a short time. These bucks are from Umatilla county and will be sold at from \$4 to \$15 a head.

—The Canyon City News says that Sheriff Combs has lately brought in four additional boarders and incarcerated them in the jail of that town. Their names are Lloyd Miller, Chick Miller, Fred Gujon and C. H. Kimball. These boys are charged with stealing cattle by the wholesale.

—Every one go to the show Friday and Saturday evenings next. This show will be far better than anything of the kind we have ever had in this place. The proprietors promise double and triple the worth of the money paid for admittance. Grown person 50 cents, children twenty five and reserved seats seventy-five.

—Three match races on the Burns race track since our last issue. Last Saturday, a race between Mackey and the bay colt, one hundred dollars aside, distance 1-4 mile, won by Mackey. Sunday, the little gray mare and little buckskin horse, fifty dollars aside, distance three hundred yards; won by the buckskin. Monday, the gray mare and a saddle horse for forty dollars aside, won by gray mare.

—David Dodge, an artesian well expert is in town. He is here to examine the formation and lay of the country, with intention, if encouraged, to sink some wells. In conversation with him last evening he stated the indications here were very favorable for artesian water, and proposes making a proposition to our town authorities today to sink a well here for the benefit of the town. Mr. Dodge is so confident of success in obtaining artesian water that he is willing to take many chances and give us the best of the bargain.

—John Campbell, a resident of Strawberry valley, Grant county, committed suicide on Monday morning, the 19th of this month, by shooting himself in the right temple with a revolver. He had been complaining for some time of his head, and was taking medicine for it. The morning he committed the rash act he got on his horse to go to Prairie City for medicine, taking his revolver with him, a short time after leaving home his horse returned without his rider and some one started immediately in search of the missing man. The searching party did not go far until they found his lifeless body lying in the road and his revolver a short distance from it.
