The Durrant Trial.

The trial of Theodore Durrant for the murder of Blanche Lamont in Emanuel Church, San Francisco, began on the 3d inst. Nothing was done on the 3d except the opening statement of the prosecuting attorney.

Second day the testimony of C. G. Noble, uncle to the murdered girl; he testified as to her disappearance on April 3d, and being found murdered in Emanuel church. The next witness was Dr. Barrett, autopsy physician at the morgue, his testimony was that the murdered girl came to her death by strangulation effected by the hands of another. Except the finger nail marks on her throat there were no other marks of violence. Third day, Sept. 5th. the day was taken up examining the diagram of Emanuel church. Detective Gibson's testimony was taken describing the finding of the body in the belfry of Emanuel church.

Sept. 6, the taking of testimony proceeded slowly. The witnesses for the day were introduced by the prosecution to complete the evidence that Blanche Lamont was murdered.

Sept. 7, the trial drags slowly along no real important witnesses for the state have been put on the stand.

Monday being a legal holiday the case was resumed on Tuesday.
