

GRAND JURY REPORT.

In the circuit court of the State of Oregon for the county of Harney. In the matter of the report of the grand jury of the county of Harney, for the October term, 1895. To said county and to the Hon. M. D. Clifford, Judge thereof: We, your grand jury, respectfully report that we have been in session eleven days, and during our session have found six true bills of indictment and two not true bills of indictment; and in addition thereto have investigated a number of other accusations made before us in which no bills have been found. We have in addition thereto visited and examined the offices of the different county officials of this county, and the county jail of this county, and also during the limited term of our session have, as well as we could, examined into the books of accounts and report of the various county officers of the county, and find the same apparently faithfully and truly kept, but that none of us are accountants or experts in the examination of books of accounts and have not had the opportunity or means of carefully and truly investigating the same as the same might be done if there were more time and more experienced persons in such business upon the jury or at our command.

Upon examination of the county jail of this county we find the same entirely unfit, either for confining prisoners with safety or with regard to their health, and we earnestly recommend to the county court of this county, that forthwith or as soon as a fund can be provided for that purpose, that the county court let contracts and construct a suitable and proper county jail for this county, and one which will not necessitate the employment of extra guards at great expense to the county, but one which will be fully adapted to the safe keeping and welfare, while under confinement, of all persons who may be unfortunate enough to be confined therein.

We further recommend that the county court of this county furnish for the treasurer's office of this county a suitable desk or case for the keeping of the books of his office. We further call attention to the fact that from evidence received before us, a number of persons are now, and have been for years past in the habit of constructing irrigating ditches and cuts across the public roads of the county, and we recommend to the county court of this county and to all supervisors of the county, that they take strenuous efforts to compel all persons so obstructing the roads to construct, keep in repair and maintain culverts or bridges across all such cuts and ditches where they so cross the main traveled highway.

Thanking your Honor and all officers of this court for the dispatch and effectiveness with which the business of this term of court has thus far been conducted, and our labors being ended, we most respectfully ask to be discharged for this term. JAMES ANDERSON, Foreman of Grand Jury.

CRIMINAL.

NOT SATISFIED.

Omaha, Nov. 3—Much interest has been created among Nebraska Democrats as a result of election returns showing the relative vote of the two wings. Mahoney, administration candidate for supreme court, received 14,500 and Phelps, silver man, 8000. Both men went on the ticket under the supreme court ruling as Democrats and the silver men claim that this was unfair to their interests and that it was not a proper test. The silver men now suggest that the silver question be submitted to a primary election in Nebraska, the regular Democratic committee and the bolting Democratic committee to agree upon primaries to be held at the same time and place, each voter to be called upon to express himself on the money question and the state convention to instruct its delegates accordingly to the national convention.

Durrant Case.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—Theodore Durrant was taken from the county jail to the superior court today for sentence for the murder of Blanche Lamont. The court granted a continuance until November 22d at the request of the defense who desired two weeks in which to prepare a motion and procure affidavits for a new trial.

The charge against Durrant for the murder of Minnie Williams, was, on motion of the district attorney, continued indefinitely. A large crowd awaited the arrival of the prisoner at the new city hall but no demonstration was made.
