

SILVER WAYS.

The Omaha commercial congress November the 27th, adopted a free coinage resolution. The vote stood nearly three to one. The basis of 16 to 1 and unlimited coinage of silver the vote stood, for free coinage 127, for gold 50.

This shows that silver is not dead nor its advocates very much paralyzed. It cannot be said that the result was the natural consequence of local sentiment. Because in Nebraska in the last state election silver got the worst of it. Three tickets were in the field, two democratic one republican and the democratic-silver ticket was beaten by both the others.
