NULL AND VOID.

Commissioner Browning, of Washington, says: "The decision of Judge Riner, upholding the hunting rights of the Bannock Indians, confirms the view of the interior department that it is not competent for the state of Wyoming to pass any law which would modify, limit, or in any way abridge the right of

the Indians to hunt, as guaranteed by their treaty, and the game laws of Wyoming as against the treaty rights of these Indians are absolutely null and void. It is not the purpose of the Indian office to allow the Indians to roam away from their reservations, but every effort will be made to keep them at home and make them earn their own living. With this end in view, efforts are being made to get the Indian reservation irrigated so that farm lands can be utilized."
