REED GETS LOUISIANA.

New Orleans, Dec. 29.—The two wings of the Republican party—the sugar planter faction, known as the "Lily Whites," and the regular party or negro contingent—held a session here yesterday. The regular faction, which will send delegates to the St. Louis convention and which was thought to be in the hands of McKinley's lieutenants, turned out to be in the control of the Reed faction when the Executive Committee met th-day and elected Tom Cage, one of the best-known negro politicians in the State, Chairman. This will insure at least three-fourths of the delegates from Louisiana to the St. Louis convention for the Maine state-man.

The "Lily White" faction will put a ticket in the field headed by Mr Henry McCall, one of the wealthiest sugar planters in the state. They have invited the support of the Populists and disaffected Democrats, and will make a strong fight against the Democracy

JUDGE JENKINS'S STATEMENT

Milwaukee, Jan. 3.—Judge Jenkins of the United States court, when asked concerning the truth of the statement telegraphed from Seattle that he is a stumbling block in the way of arranging a joint operation of the Northern Pacific, and that, as a result, there will be two distinct sets of receivers for this property, said:

"There is nothing in that statement, for it is ridiculous on the face of it. You say it says I am in the way in persisting in holding both McHenry and Bigelow, and will make no concessions whatever. At the same time it says that Messrs. McHenry, Bigelow, Burlein and Galloway are to be appointed receivers by the other courts

"There is no controversy whatever between the judges over this Northern Pacific receivership, and the statement that there is a conflict is erroneous. It is purely and simply a question of primary jurisdiction. That is the subject for determination, not the question of the personality of the receivers. There is no controversy, so far as we are concerned, over the make-up of the receivership. All we want to consider is the matter of jurisdiction. That is all there is to it.

A MURDERER ESCAPED.

Roseburg, Ore., Dec. 30.—Samuel G. Brown, under sentence of death January 31st for the murder of Alfred Kincaid at Oakland, in this county, in August, 1894, has again escaped from jail here. At 7:30 this morning the jailer opened Brown's cell to allow him to enter the corridor to eat breakfast. At 10 o'clock his absence was discovered. He must have had help from the outside. Two bars of the west corridor window were sawed off at the top and bottom, making an

aperture 12 by 14 inches. Brown evidently left immediately after breakfast. A posse of about 50 are scouring the country.
