"The brain has been my especial study and I have worked independthree years to photograph it. I first sought to accomplish my purpose by passing a continuous current of electricity through the brain, illuminating it by the spark, and then I tried the interrupted curr nt, but this produced paralysis of the brain, rendering senseless the subjects. The principle is illustrated ! by a flash of lightning on a dark night which carries images through which it travels to the eye. From this, indeed it was suggested to me ! the same idea might be applied to the brain. Again, you know the firefly is made almost transparent by its tiny lantern.

· I am still far from having perfected the instrument by which I am able to photograph the brain. Of course the more solid structures are reflected on the plates, and find that the less exposure I give to the photographic plate the easier I apparently am able to photograph translucent matter "

Though in a measure satisfied that the process was one by which the brain could be photographed without risk of life, it may be stated that the experimenter selected him self as his subject, that no other in life might be endangered


