### TO SEARCH FOR GOLD.

San Francisco, March 12—A mysterious expedition left for Alaska today. The steam schooner Elcelesior was chartered, and so quietly was the matter carried out that the owners of the vessel, C. A. Hooper & Co., knew hardly anything of the plans of the managers. Last year some wealthy citizens of Boston heard rumors of immense gold-bearing deposits at Cook's inlet, and A. Pennock, an experienced miner, was sent to view the country.

Pennock made a thorough search for the shining metal, and, in his opinion, was successful beyond question. He, with a few friends, at once measured off over 10 acres of land which showed gold from the grass roots on to bedrock. Water rights were secured and the prospectors washed out a few ounces and started for Boston. The gold is both fine and coarse, and the mint here values it at \$16 per ounce.

The Boston investigators incorporated as the Alaska & Boston Company, and \$100,000 was paid in. Henry E. Spaulding and G. W. T. Braman, the latter being at the head of the West Side electrical roads, came to this city and began preparations for the expedition.

The destination of the expedition has been carefully guarded, but it is known the objective point is about 20 miles from Resurrection creek, at the head of Cook inlet.

### PLAYMATE OF JAY GOULD.

Seattle, Wash. March 12—Jason Gould-Corbin, a wealthy farmer living at Auburn, called at the times office this afternoon and told a story concerning the early life of Jay Gould, which comes with special interest at the present time.

On February 24, the Associated Press sent out a story concerning the claim that Gould had married a wife in his younger days, and after living for three months with her, deserted her. Now a young woman appears and brings suit for a share of the Gould estate, claiming that she is a daughter of the great railway magnate by his first wife. The dispatch states that everything rested on it being proven that in his younger days Jason Gould was the man who in later years went by the now famous name of Jay Gould.

Farmer Corbin says they were one and the same man. Gould and Corbin were children together in the same town and grew up together. Corbin was named after an uncle of Jay's. Corbin's aunt also became John B. Gould's—Jay's father's—second wife, and thus the families were connected. Corbin says that Jay's father never called his son anything else but Jason.
