CONTINUED NEXT WEEK.

The secretary of the interior has affirmed the lower ruling in the case of the California & Oregon Land Company, assignee of the Oregon Central Military Wagon Road Company, against Henry A. Stevens, whose homestead entry in the Lakeview, Or, land district had been allowed.

In the swamp land contest of the state of Oregon and Henry Miller, and E. B. Hanley, grantees, vs. Charles Nelson, in the Burns land district, the lower ruling, holding the state's claim for rejections, is affirmed. The tract lies on both sides of the Silvies river, formerly the boundary of the Malheur Indian reservation. In February, 1885, the state selected the land as swamp and overflowed land, under the act of March 12, 1860. After the local officers' hearing the receiver recommended that the claim of the state and her grantees be canceled, and that Nelson be permitted to perfect his timber culture entry. The register, on the other hand, recommended that the state's claim be sustained, and that Nelson's entry be canceled. Sixteen months ago the general land office approved the recommendation of the receiver, and found that, after a careful consideration of the testimony submitted, the state had failed to establish the swamp character of the land in contest, and held the claim for rejection.—Orewoman.
