A SUSPECTED COUNTERFEITER.

New York, April 1—Emanuel Ninger was arrested tonight and confined in Ludlow-street jail in default of \$20,000 bail. The secret service agents of the federal government believe they have a counterfeiter who has baffled their efforts for 17 years. It was in 1875 that the government detectives first began to hunt for a penman who could, with a simple pen, ink and paper, so successfully imitate a costly engraved United States greenback or bank note that it defied detection by an expert. Agent George Bagg, of the secret service, is of the opinion that Ninger is the man they have looked for so long. Bagg claims that Ninger has made a confession, and has surrendered the pens, ink and paper which he used in making the counterfeit bills. Ninger has lived on a small farm near Flagtown, N. J., for years.

Murdered by Apaches.

San Simon, Ariz., April 1—Settlers in this part of the territory are wrought up to a high pitch of excitement by the murder by Apaches of Alfred Hands, the details of which have just been learned. Hands' head was crushed in by rocks, his abdomen was cut open and gunshot wounds were found in several parts of the body. Tracks on the ground showed that Indians had committed the crime. The murderers were not satisfied with killing Hands and robbing his home, but they destroyed everything else. Evidently the Indians had surprised the unfortunate settler when he was busy outside the house, and finding him physically disabled, stoned him to death and perhaps mutilated him when still alive. At present cowboys and a detachment of cavalry, under Lieutenant Rice, are in pursuit of the Indians, but owing to the good start there is little hope that they will be overtaken. The settlers hope that the territorial government will take the matter up and form a band of determined rangers, well paid, for the purpose of wiping out this band of murderers.
