Pasadena, Cal., April 16—Just ten days ago Professor Swift, of the Mount Lowe observatory, discovered an object in the heavens which he suspected to be a new comet. On Monday night the suspicion was partially verified, and last night fully so. The visitor is in right ascension 3 hours 38 minutes, declination north, 15 deg. 40 min. The comet is bright with a short tail. Its motion is very slow.

New Ballot Law.

We wish to call the attention of voters to an amendment in the manner of voting. Our last legislature amended the method of making ballots. You do not strike out the names of the candidates you do not desire to vote for, but instead a cross is made at the left of the name of the candidate of your choice.

We give the amendment: "On the receipt of the white ballot as aforesaid the elector shall forthwith and without leaving the enclosed space, retire alone to one of the compartments provided, and shall there prepare his ballot, by making a cross immediately to the left of the name of the candidate of his choice for each office to be filled, or by writing in the name of the person he wishes to vote for."

Sentenced For Life.

Ottawa, Ont., April 18.—Mrs. Bell, for cruel treatment to her grand children, was today sentenced to life imprisonment.

She punished a girl of 16 and a boy of 15 with the most fiendish tortures her ingenuity could devise. Stripping them to the thinnest clothing she would soak them in water and compel them to sit before open windows when the temperature was several degrees below zero, until their attire was frozen stiff. On one occasion the boy was kept at work in the cold, improperly clad, until his clothes were frozen and dropped off. The children were fed vituals mixed with noxious fluids like kerosene, turpentine, and even worse.
