WILL BREAK THE TROCHA.

New York, April 20—A dispatch to the World from Havana says: If General Maceo succeeds in crossing the 18 mile barrier in spite of the 50,000 Spanish regulars pressing him on all sides, General Weyler must confess, as General Campos did, that the campaign is a failure, and that Spain cannot end this war by her own unaided forces.

The rebel general has sent word to his friends in Havana that he will break through the trocha when he is ready, and that when the first showers of rain fall the captain-general's plan will turn to dust. It is certain that General Maceo has some sure means of suddenly assembling his roving bands on this side of the trocha; some say by means of colored paper, balloons and others by messages. There is a growing belief here that if General Weyler is outmaneuvered, Spain will presently welcome the friendly mediation of the United States. Even the Spaniards share this feeling.

Prisoners of war are condemned to death as incendiaries without the proof of guilt. Evidence that a rebel soldier belonged to a column of the enemy which burned property is sufficient to insure his death. The prisoner's death depends upon whether he joined the offending band before or after the incendiary occurred. It is said that nearly a hundred prisoners will be shot as incendiaries within a few days.

A HAUNTED HOUSE.

Guthrie, O. T., April 20—There is much excitement over the alleged haunting of the house in which Ella Mayer, the unfortunate girl from Pueblo, Colo., was found dead two weeks ago. The inmates have all moved out because of fear, and neighbors say that the girl's spirit appears every night and can be seen wandering about the house, moaning and crying for help. There are rumors that the girl was not dead when found, but was buried alive. Her brother has arrived from Colorado, and will have the body exhumed and an examination made.
