The cry has already gone abroad in our county that some of the nominees for county offices are what is termed here "Company candidates." That there is not a word of truth in the report every man of good sense should be able to see, but men in this age, as well as here before, are in many instances easily persuaded to believe what upon consideration and second sober sensible thought, proves erroneous. Every delegate to the county conventions, all three, democratic, republican and populist, know of a truth, that there was absolutely no wire pulling in either of the conventions by the cattle men. All the delegates with whom we conversed agreed in saying the conventions this year were purer from political trickstering than any held in the county since the county has been organized.

Then we say drop that old "oyster" and let the candidates fight it out on fair ground and upon the merits of each.

We know all the candidates have enemies, for all men who amount to anything politically have their enemies and friends, and of course many men have good reasons for opposing a candidate and it is their right and privilege to do so, but we would urge fair means, not to spring something on a candidate without an iota of truth in its foundation to base such an accusation upon.

We are aware of the fact that heretofore the defeat of a candidate was guaranteed provided it was clearly proven he would favor the cattle corporation. But this year this cannot be said and substantiated, of any candidate in the field irrespective of party. The election of county officers cannot hinge upon that in this campaign, and we sincerely hope it will soon be dropped or at least not considered.

The Oregonian don't like the congressional nominee on the republican ticket in this district. And we thought for a while it would kick entirely out of the harness, and bring all its batteries to bear on an independent movement, and run a candidate on that sort of a ticket or support the prohibition candidate, who comes out solid for gold, maybe because he thought he would get the support of the Oregonian and its kind. That paper, we mean the Oregonian, takes a great deal of pride in having the head lines announcing the result of conventions, as follows: "For sound Money."

Say, isn't silver sound money? It seems to have the true ring and we are certainly persuaded to believe that if it is all coined the people of this government can make good use it.

New Ballot Law.

We wish to call the attention of voters to an amendment in the manner of voting. Our last legislature amended the method of making ballots. You do not strike out the names of the candidates you do not desire to vote for, but instead a cross is made at the left of the name of the candidate of your choice.

We give the amendment: "On the receipt of the white ballot as aforesaid the elector shall forthwith and without leaving the enclosed space, retire alone to one of the compartments provided, and shall there prepare his ballot, by making a cross immediately to the left of the name of the candidate of his choice for each office to be filled, or by writing in the name of the person he wishes to vote for."
