Heard His Own Funeral.

PORTSMOUTH, O., June 21.—The funeral of a living man, plain old Lorenzo Dow McKenny at which he was present, was preached at Fallen Timbers, 20 miles from here, today, to an assembly of 8000 people. It was in a primeval forest of grand oak, in camp meeting style. Rev Forest Evans conducted the ceremonies. Just behind him sat the living Lorenzo Dow McKenny. Incongruities in the shape of hokey-pokey, ginger bread popcorn and lemonade, with all their accompaniments, were discordantly present. A committee of venerable men, in lieu of pallbearers, conducted the subject to the platform. They had all known him from youth. Then gray-haired Jared Blakeman, nearly 90 years old, started singing "Jesus, Lover of My Soul," and the caken vaults of that temple echoed the sound of 8000 voices. After prayer by Rev. Evans, the place again rang with the song, "The Sweet Bye and Bye." Then came the text, "The time of my departure is now at hand." At the conclusion the hymn, "Are You Washed in the Blood of the Lamb?" was sung, and then by invitation, the congregation filed by, taking leave of the departed, tearfully shaking him by the hand.

TWELVE MEN DROWNED.

Spokane, June 22—A story is in circulation here to the effect that twelve tramps were drowned in the wreck of a freight train on the Great Northern last Wednesday.

Information is that the westbound train struck a slide above Kootenai Falls, Idaho, and twelve cars were carried from the track into the river.

Some of the cars floated. In one of the latter, according to the story were twelve tramps stealing a ride. One managed to reach the top of the car and cried for help. People on the shore tried to throw ropes to him but failed and the car and contents were swept over the fall.

The report of the fatality fails of definite confirmation but railroad officials are close mouthed about the wreck. No train hands were injured and the engine and caboose stayed on the track.

The Kootenai river is a raging torrent at this season of the year and in some places is a mile wide. If the tramps were swept over the falls their bodies may never be recovered. No blame attaches to the railroad in any event.—Statesman.

HAIL IN NEBRASKA.

Omaha, June 22—A terrible hail storm raged last night in the western portion of Nebraska. At Meg-eath siding on the Union Pacific, the hail reached a depth of ever two feet. The section men were sent out with shovels to clear the track, so that the trains could run. The hail was packed in upon the track like pebbles. In some places the hail stacked up to a depth of four feet but this was only in draws and pockets.
