able that the counties would gain instead of lose in taxes.

It is currently reported about there that one of the great cattle companies represented at the Denver meeting, that is asking for a gift of the ranges of the United States, has leased from the successors of the wagon-road land grant steers, all the range sections they hold in this and Harney Counties, with the avowed purpose of preventing sheepowners from driving their bands across them. This will prevent the latter from enjoying "their full proportionate share" of the ranges, even before there is any leasing law. Isn't this a fair indication of what will happen if this pernicious measure becomes a law?

Now, it seems to us that the whole sum of this matter is this: It is a struggle as to who shall go, the large cattle companies or we might also say all livestock companies, or the settlers? And, if it is true that "the fittest alone survive," it will remain for the Congress of the United States to say which is best for our country, a few scattered big stock ranches, or an almost continuous chain of farms and villages from sea to sea. We think the bill should be "smothered in committee" and feel sure that if left to a vote of the settlers of the range country, it would be "snowed under."
