United States Senator John H. Mitchell has sailed from Europe for the United States.

The Pomological Society of America, the highest authority on fruits in America, has awarded the Wilder medal to the State of Oregon for the horticultural exhibit at the Pan-American Exposition. This is the greatest honor that can be bestowed on American fruits, and Oregonians are correspondingly elated.

Theodore Roosevelt was born in New York City, Oct. 27, 1858. He became president before his 43rd birthday, at an earlier age than any other president. Grant became president at 47, Cleveland at 48, Pierce and Garfield at 49, Polk at 50, Tyler at 72. The oldest at accession was the first Harrison, aged 68.

Czolgosz, the name of the man who shot President McKinley, offers a lingual problem to nine-tenths of those who attempt to pronounce it, says the Chicago Tribune. It is one of those names which the English language cannot spell phonetically, and which the average English speaking person stumbles over in trying to express after hearing it spoken by a Russian. Written according to its sound, the name of Czolgosz, or its nearest equivalent, is "Tscholgosch," or more broadly speaking, "Shollgosch."

Another paper says the correct rendering slips from the easily, being simply "Schloss." The "z-o" in the first syllable are silent; also the "g" in the second syllable. Still another pronunciation offered is "Schalgotch," or "Swalgotch," with the "t" in the second syllable sounded. Which is right?

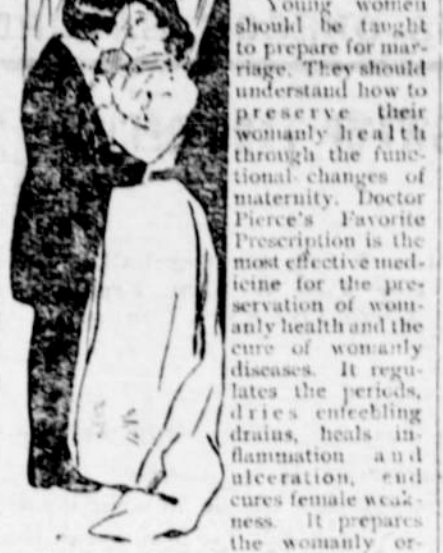

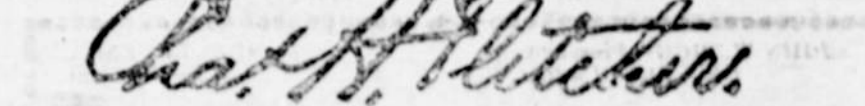
