County Clerk A. G. King, of Malheur county, arrived from Vale Thursday to attend to some land matters. He was accompanied by Mrs. King.

The Wright's Point Improvement Company filed a list of their lands with the local land officers Tuesday, the list amounting to about 3000 acres.

W. E. Burke who is representing one of the irrigation enterprises in this section, is a Burns visitor. He is here looking after a survey of the lands preparatory to having a list filed with the local land officers.

According to the annual report of Land Commissioner Hermann the fees and commissions of the Burns Land office during the year amounted to \$6,207. Of this amount \$5,146 is credited as paid out in salaries at this place.

Among those attending the organization of the Malheur and Harney County Woolgrowers' Association, which was held in Ontario last Friday, we note the names of James Paul, W. J. King, J. R. Jenkins and A. S. Swain of this county.

A rehearing in the Emmett Clark case has been denied by the Supreme court of the state. This is one of the Road Company cases in which a decision was rendered against Mr. Clark in the United States District court some months ago.

Henry Blackwell was in town a few days this week. He informed us that he is feeding 300 head of cattle at the Levens ranch south of town, and that his brother John is feeding another bunch near Long creek. They intend the cattle for early Spring shipment.

We acknowledge the receipt of the annual report of the Commissioner of the General Land Office to the Secretary of the Interior, showing the business transacted by the district land offices and also the work covered by the various divisions of that department.

Wm. Butler, of Long Creek, was in Burns Wednesday. He is in this section buying feeders which he intends wintering near Long Creek. He has not been entirely successful in securing the class of cattle wanted, wishing to secure yearlings, but has picked up a mixed bunch of 150 head.

The gentlemen's prize was won by Allen Jones who represented a Mexican vaquero. The winners are in receipt of many congratulations for their splendid representations.

Organization of the Malheur and Harney County Woolgrowers' Association was effected at Ontario last Friday. Thomas Turnbull was elected president and E. H. Test secretary and treasurer. Hereafter the wool of these two counties will be controlled by this association, and auction sales will prevail. Heretofore the wool has been held for months until buyers could be given their time to look into the matter.

The water and light proposition was defeated Monday by a vote of 7. Tuesday a number of our leading business men thinking that the question was not thoroughly understood and that this occasioned its defeat decided to put in circulation among the taxpayers a petition asking the town council to again open the question and secure the services of a competent person to ascertain the requirement and probable cost of a plant suitable for the place and after this is done to vote bonds for its construction. The petition also asks that a committee of citizens be appointed to act with the council in considering the acceptance of any proposition. We understand the paper has received the signature of a large majority of the taxpayers, quite a number of whom had voted "no" at the election Monday. It is not known when the council will take action in the matter. We are informed that one or two of that body will oppose a reconsidering of the matter since its defeat by the people Monday.

A very serious accident occurred Sunday afternoon about five miles below Warm Springs, the unfortunate party in the affair being Lyle Linsey, of Mineral, Idaho, who was en route from Huntington to Burns with a four horse team and two wagons heavily loaded with freight. Having become tired of riding Mr. Linsey was walking beside his team, when they became frightened and started to run. In an effort to secure the lines the gentleman fell under the front wheel of the lead wagon, both wheels of which, and also those of the trail wagon, passed over him. Two other gentlemen, freighters, who were with Mr. Linsey at the time, stopped his team, and at once summoned Dr. Hoople, who found, on examination, several ribs broken, a serious puncture in the right lung, a bad arm and severe bruises about the head and face. The Dr. had him removed to Vale, and he is being cared for at the Hess hotel. While his injuries are very serious they are not necessarily fatal. At this writing the patient is resting very comfortably.—Vale Gazette.
