Receiver Chas. Newell was this week in telephone communication with the officials of the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad relative to the filing of the plats of their survey. These plats were placed in the local land office last spring. The officials were very curious to know if every thing regarding them was all right, which had led those knowing of the inquiry to renew their hopes of a railroad activity that means more to this section than any other of the lines proposed.

Stephen Carver, president of the Bank of Ontario, has returned from a trip to Chinook, Mont., says the Ontario correspondent in the Oregonian of the 14th, and reports that he has plans that will give Ontario a first-class wool scouring mill. If plans do not miscarry the plant will be in operation by the 1st of July, and will be ample to take care of the entire clip of Malheur and Harney Counties. This season the clip amounted to 1,250,000 pounds. The saving in freight charges on the coming clip will amount to something like \$25,000. There will be a soap factory in connection, and other smaller business enterprises incidental thereto. The citizens will be asked for a small bonus.

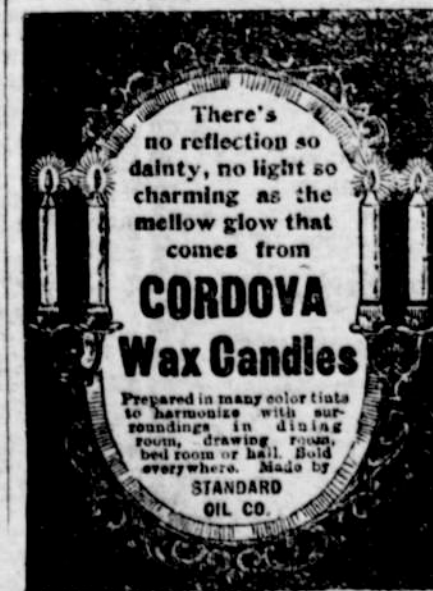

TO MAKE ROAD.

Harney People Want Aid of the Chamber of Commerce Says the Democrat.

At last something is about to be done regarding the long discussed and much talked about wagon road from Baker City to the town of Drewsey, in Harney county, says the Baker City Democrat. After spending some years in talk, the citizens of Harney have now gotten up a huge petition to the Baker City Chamber of Commerce, asking the co-operation of that body to build the road, which will bring Harney county 40 miles nearer to the railroads and markets, and which will add an entire county to the trade of Baker City. This petition will be laid before the Chamber of Commerce within a short time. It is problematical what that body will do. Archie J. Murray, of Unity, and other citizens along the proposed line are now in the city and are greatly interested in the matter. The road from this city to Drewsey will be 85 miles long. The people of Harney now go to Ontario and Huntington with all their traffic and hauling. These towns are distant from Drewsey about 125 miles. With the completion of the proposed road all this traffic, in fact, the entire trade of Harney county, would come to Baker City, where it naturally belongs. The people of Harney county naturally desire this road because it will shorten the distance to the railroad 40 miles. Baker City desires the road because it will cause almost the entire traffic of Harney county to come to this city instead of Ontario and Huntington, where it now goes.

Not only will all the teaming and cattle driving come this way, but the big line of immigrants from the Goose Lake country to the railroad, which now comes out at Ontario, will find its terminus at Baker City. The emigrants will desire to come by way of the new road, because the water and grass is better than on the Ontario road. The Harney county people argue that with a good road to Baker City, the population of their county will rapidly increase, because much fine lands there are not opened up to settlement simply because of their inaccessibility.

This road will not have to be built in its entirety. It is already made from Baker City to Unity, a distance of 42 miles, and 10 miles of the road from Unity to Willow Creek can also be utilized. If the chamber of Commerce gives the necessary encouragement the road will doubtless be built.
