Letter From Charles Becker, of Westfall, Malheur County.

Dear Sir:—I read Moody's letter in your paper and it is my opinion as well as others I heard express themselves on this all important matter, that the people through this section should introduce a cross bill to these preposterous Lease Bills now before Congress in order to strengthen Mr. Moody's hands who is doing effective work on the committee on Public Lands. I believe Mr. Moody is all right on this proposition and it behooves us to assist him all we can for he has a hard fight before him. As Mr. Moody says in his letter, some legislation will have to be done as regards this Range Question for the Government is determined to protect our range against its entire annihilation which is sure to happen if there is not some means devised to stop the driving in of those tramping, migratory herds of sheep which seem to be bent on destroying everything within their reach. Why not Government control and limitations and a per capita tax for all stock on the range, and prefered rights to settlers and freeholds as against transient migratory herds. I think that would give us relief and give all an even show. Something will have to be done, better half a loaf than no bread at all.
