FACTS.

Eleven precincts out of eighteen were represented in the Central committee meeting. Ten of this number were in favor of electing delegates to the state convention.

Two of the five names signed to a call for a convention to elect another set of delegates, have been pronounced forgeries.

Congressman Moody did not know any thing more about the proposed action of the Committee than did The Dalles Chronicle. The Committee in requesting them to vote for Mr. Moody for Congress, were but voicing the sentiments of three-fourths of the people of Harney county irrespective of politics.

The committee in carrying out the program they did, were only following a precedent established on two occasions in the past.

Two of the howlers against the action of the Committee, were themselves elected in the same manner.

The proposed action of the gang to bullyrag the candidates into line at the County Convention for their delegates to the state convention, was the chief reason for the action of the committee in forestalling their scheme.

Harney county has its share of disgruntled, disappointed office seekers, who are always ready to oppose those in office who will not do their bidding. The present contest for Congressmen has set them to work.

Two of the five names signed to the call in the News for the "pushers" primaries and convention have been denounced as forgeries. Yet that religious sheet stops to say in the same breath something about "principle in politics."

In 1890, John Vaughn, then leader of the "push," went to the County Central Committee with 10 proxies and delegates were elected to the state convention. Six years ago the County Central Committee elected delegates to the State convention, one of these being A. W. Gowen, now howling against the action of the recent Committee meeting. Here is two instances where the gang now headed by "Slick ear" Hanley sent delegates to the state convention from the Central committee. Why their howl now? They want to go again.

Call for Republican Primaries and Convention.

Burns, Mar. 1st.—The republican county central committee met in response to call of Chairman Chas. Newell, and the meeting was called to order by the chairman at 10:30 A. M. Secretary Jos Robertson being absent, J. H. Neal was appointed secretary pro. tem.

Chair appointed committee on credentials, as follows: Ira Stubblefield, A. W. Hulbert and Jos. Hill (committeeman appointed by Chairman for Island precinct, in place of L. C. Grout, removed from county.)

Committee on credentials reported eleven members of the committee, present in person and by proxy, as follows: Burns—Chas Newell; Happy Valley—Jas. Paul, by Ira Stubblefield, proxy; Lake—Chas. Haines, by Fred Haines, proxy, Drewsey—Jos. Robertson, by A. W. Gowen, proxy; Warm Springs—A. W. Hulbert; Saddle Butte—C. T. Miller, by J. L. Sitz, proxy; Silvie—A. Wintermeier, by Chas. Newell, proxy; Poison Creek—Ira Stubblefield; Pine Creek—L. C. Bradford, by Fred Haines, proxy; Diamond—M. Horton, by J. H. Neal, proxy; Island—Jos. Hill, and all entitled to seats as per roll, Report accepted.

Committee on order of business, appointed by Chair, as follows: Fred Haines, J. L. Sitz and A. W. Gowen.

Majority report that county convention be held Apr. 12th, 1902, and primaries Mar. 22d, 1902 carried.

A. W. Gowen, of minority report withdrew from meeting, with the parting warning that "the election laws of Oregon require that acceptance of nominations, by all county candidates (nominees) shall be filed at least 60 days before the date of the general elections within the State."

On motion, apportionment of delegates to county convention, was as follows: One delegate at large, and one delegate for each ten votes, or major fraction thereof, cast for W. J. Furnish as presidential elector, in 1900, delegates being apportioned as follows:

- Alvord, 1; Burns, 14; Crane, 2; Catlow, 1; Curry, 1; Diamond, 2; Drewsey, 4; Harney, 5; Happy, 2; Island, 3; Lake, 3; Poison Creek, 2; Pine Creek, 1; Pueblo, 1; Silvie, 2; Saddle Butte, 4; Wild Horse, 3; Warm Springs, 2.

Motion carried, that one set of delegates be elected to serve at both State and Congressional conventions, and for delegates, Fred Haines, J. L. Sitz and J. H. Neal were duly nominated and unanimously elected.

Motion carried that delegates to congressional convention be requested to vote for Hon. M. A. Moody for Congress.

Motion carried that committee recommend to county convention that no proxy be voted by any one not a resident and voter in precinct

where such proxy originates.

Motion to reconsider action on dates of county convention and county primaries carried.

Motion carried to make further investigation of State election laws. Investigation made.

Motion to change date of county primaries from March 22nd, to Mar. 26th. Carried.

Meeting adjourned.

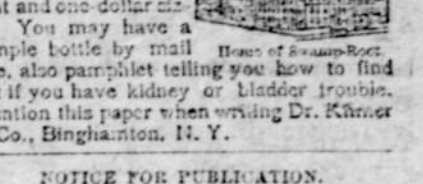
