Dr. Volp is a classical scholar, he having received his degree of A. M. before he studied medicine. Dr. Volp intends to take another post-graduate course this fall, perhaps in New York.

**County Court Proceedings.**

County Court met in regular session last Wednesday with County Judge Sparrow and Commissioner E. J. Williams in attendance.

The Court should have met one week earlier, the first Wednesday, instead of the first Wednesday after the first Monday as heretofore, but as the law is a new one, the members were not acquainted with its provisions, and the County Judge was the only member present at that time.

A complete summary of the proceedings is as follows:

In the matter of the appointment of a Justice of the Peace for Diamond precinct, J. W. Crawford appointed; for Happy Valley precinct, James Paul; Curry precinct, J. F. Oakerman; Warm Springs precinct, M. V. Baker.

In the matter of a reward for the arrest and detention of Pat Moore wanted in this county on a charge of murder. Reward of \$500, offered and sheriff ordered to have notices printed informing the public of the same.

In the matter of warrant No. 350, Class "K," to M. M. Cushing for \$30. Court ordered warrant canceled, the amount for which it was drawn having already been paid.

In the matter of the petition of Sam Hall for liquor license to sell liquors in Pueblo precinct, the same granted for a period of three months from April 9th 1902.

In the matter of the petition of Alex C. Burke for license to sell liquors in Wild Horse precinct the same ordered granted when proper bond was filed.

In the matter of building the approaches to the new bridge across Silvie River on the Lawen-Narrows road. Contract granted to F. Crowley.

In the matter of expediting the accounts of the county books and records for the year ending June 30th 1902. Contract awarded to W. E. Houston for \$150.

In the matter of bids to grade the county roads: Following bids granted to John E. Johnson; road leading south from Harney, \$1,945; Houser Lane road, \$565; road near the Mary J. Emerson, H. D., \$560; road east from Lawen, \$675

In the matter of grading the Meander Line road. Contract granted to C. A. Haines and A. McKinzie for \$2,937.

In the matter of the official bond of A. E. Brown, as Stock Inspector. Bond in the sum of \$1000 with C. Cummins and P. G. Smith sureties filed and accepted.

In the matter of the petition of J. H. and Dorcas Neal, to change the county road where the same crosses their lands, granted.

In the matter of the application of M. Zeigenfus for leave to pull the pipe at the artesian well in this county sunk by Harney County. The application of said M. Zeigenfus, is now granted on the condition that should the said M. Zeigenfus succeed in pulling the pipe the County shall retain one-half of the pipe taken out and M. Zeigenfus the other one-half and should the said M. Zeigenfus fail in his attempt to pull the pipe he may then break it by blasting it at such depth as he may deem most likely to obtain a flow of water.

In the matter of John E. Johnson's contract to grade parts of the County road. Bond for the performance of work filed in the sum of \$6,690, with C. F. McKinney, C. E. Kenyon and C. H. Voegtly as sureties.

In the matter of the contract and bond of C. A. Haines and A. McKinzie. Bond in the sum of \$5900 with C. E. Kenyon and C. Cummins as sureties filed and accepted.

In the matter of the application of L. G. Ross for county aid, accepted as a charge.

In the matter of counting and destroying scalps. Scalps numbering 2,038 received and warrants to the amount of \$4,076, drawn in payment thereof.

In the matter of the petition of R. R. Sitz and 30 others for a County Road, J. P. Rector, Robert Irvind and Geo. Buchanan were appointed viewers, to view and locate

said road and John H. Neal surveyor.

Peter Clemens was appointed County Road Master at a salary of \$150 per month, from which is to be deducted all amounts due for services of surveyor or engineer.

In the matter of issuing County warrants. Bills to the amount of \$2,064.34 was duly presented, and allowed in the sum of \$2,993.14.
