The \$5,000 bonds recently voted by the city council to pay off the old city indebtedness, have been delivered by the printer. We understand the First National Bank of this place will place a bid for the entire issue. The bonds run five years and draw six per cent interest. The issue will consist of four \$1000 bonds and ten of the \$100 denomination.

The following officers of the Citizens' Business College have been announced: President, W. B. Johnson; Vice President, A. W. Gowau; Secretary, Dalton Biggs; Treasurer, H. M. Horton; Directors, I. S. Geer, F. O. Jackson, Rev. A. J. Irwin, M. E. Rigby, Lester Hamilton; Building Committee, Chas. McPheters, H. L. Brisco, F. O. Jackson.

The time for holding the County Fair will probably be set for Sept. 15 to 20. This date has been suggested and having met with the approval of a large number, may finally be accepted by the management when properly organized. The program will consist of prizes on all products raised in Harney county, and for livestock exhibits. A speed program will be arranged with good purses to induce outside horsemen to attend. A purse will also be put up for a series of ball games.

Monday, the Harney Valley Improvement Company, through M. Fitzgerald as the state's selecting agent, filed an application to about 60,000 acres of land in Harney county. The first list of lands filed by this Company aggregating about 50,000 acres, was rejected on account of some irregularities in making out and filing the papers, which necessitated the filing of a new list. The last set of maps, etc., is said to have been drawn up in a very creditable manner and it is thought no trouble will be met with in getting the application approved until it reaches the General Land Office, where Commissioner Hermann, with his ever watchful eye, is death to all land grabbers, and a very satisfactory showing will have to be made before approval. As we have stated before, it is a fact, that if all the water of Silver's River, in the flood season of the year, was turned upon this land there would not be a sufficient amount to cover the land. The selections embraced in this application virtually takes up all the government land north of the Lake. It is not confined to one body, but consists of sections here and there widely separated from the main tract, another thing that makes it practically impossible of irrigation under the Company's plan. It is hoped, that the Land Department has, or will thoroughly investigate the matter before approving the application.

The city council at their meeting Wednesday evening passed an ordinance establishing a fire limit. The district included in the ordinance takes in a strip of three blocks in width running the entire distance of the town north and south. Commencing at the street on which the White Front Livery barn is located it runs back to the court house. On the north it commences at the Svme hotel and extends to the southern city limits. Under this ordinance all buildings in the district described must be furnished with flues built of brick or stone put up in a workmanship manner.

A mother rabbit and seven little ones were discovered in a bunch of tall grass near the west door of the court house one day this week. Janitor Gould had noticed the mother around the court house for some time, she having wintered in the woodshed and neighboring yards, but the unearthing of the nest of young ones, fell to the lot of a dog which happened to strike the trail. The mother has become quite tame and stood quietly by while a number of persons were fondling her offsprings the other evening. Janitor Gould will not disturb the happy home.

We have before mentioned a difference between officers in land offices, and heartily wish every office we have to do with was supplied with conscientious and obliging gentlemen like those in The Dalles office. Every kind of business, regular or requests for information, receive prompt attention, and this is the same in season and out of season with those officers. To illustrate: About March 1 last a contest was filed in the La Grande office and no date has yet been set, and the contestant is held in suspense; on June 14 an affidavit was filed at the Burns office and the date was set two days later, while on June 16th one was filed at The Dalles office and date was set on the same day. And the latter office is doing an immense timber and stone land business just now, too.—Long Creek Ranger.

By way of response to the above effusion, we are assured by the officers of the U. S. Land Office of this place that the case referred to in connection with their office was a contest case received by Canyon City mail at closing of office hours, Saturday, June 14, last, and that the case was at once docketed, and notice issued, Monday, June 16, which was the earliest date on which it could have been issued under the circumstances.

Just why the Ranger wished to make this little "swipe" at the Land Office management at this place, we are left to conjecture. We well venture to assert, however, that the business of the Land Office at this point, is being kept as nearly up to date as that of any other office of the kind in the state, any insinuation to the contrary notwithstanding.

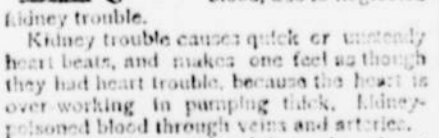
