County Court Proceedings.

In the matter of the petition of Lewis & Co for a license to sell liquors in Saddle Butte precinct. License granted for a period of three months from August 12, 1902.

In the matter of extending the time for returning the assessment roll for the year 1902. Time extended until Sept. 22.

In the matter of the annual report of J. H. Loggan, supervisor Road Dist No. 3, J. T. Moffatt, 7; S. Whiting, 4; A. McKenzie, 11; J. P. Gearheart, 6; D. Carey, 8; R. Hankins, Jr., 5, approved.

In the matter of the payment of the bounty on wild animals. Clerk ordered to not pay any bounty on any wild animal until further orders from the court.

Supreme Court Decisions.

Monday the supreme court of Oregon handed down a number of decisions, making the following rulings:

It is not necessary in criminal cases for the prosecuting attorney to insert at the foot of an information the names of any witnesses other than those examined by him.

The terms of a proposed county road must be so designated in the petition that a person of ordinary intelligence need not mistake the location.

Where men are charged jointly with the commission of a crime and are tried separately, it is error to admit testimony regarding statements made by another in the absence of the defendant after the alleged conspiracy has terminated.

When an agent refuses to pay over money collected for his principal, the latter may bring an action in trover, and need not describe the particular money converted.

County Treasurer R. A. Miller informs us that Harney County's portion of the state school fund is now in his hands for distribution. The amount is \$1,500.85 or \$1.55 per capita. The apportionment was made last Saturday by the State Treasurer, the total fund for the state amounting to \$214,030.25, which was distributed among the several counties upon the basis of school population. This is the largest sum ever realized in one year upon the irreducible school fund, though the rate of interest is lower now than it was a few years ago. The irreducible school fund is made up of the money received from the sale of school lands. The money is lent on real estate security at 6 per cent interest, and the interest is divided among the counties August 1 of each year. The school population of Harney County is 1,907.
