The report of Prof. Russell, the government artesian water expert, printed on the first page of this issue, will lead considerable encouragement to the people of this county, who have for years been trying to secure water to reclaim the large land wastes of this section. We believe that an experimental well put down by one familiar with the work will secure water at a reasonable depth. The people of this county are indebted to Representative Moody for what has been done in this line and we will note still further fruits of his labor for his constituents in this portion of the state.

In addition to the above investigations there will be other government parties in this field working on other lines. They will consist of two parties from the Geological Department, one of which will extend the mineral investigation, such as that made by Prof. Lindgren in his report on the Gold Belt of the Blue Mountains, and another which will examine the character of the land covered by the temporary Blue Mountain Reserve, with a view of reporting to the Interior Department so that they may have not only the character of the land, but also the situation as viewed by the settlers before the final action is taken in establishing the permanent lines.

At the President's invitation Mitchell, the leader of the coal strike, and several of the chief operators met in Washington on Friday, the 3d inst., to consult with a view to settling the differences between them. The operators proved deaf to the President's appeal to their patriotism, and while Mitchell expressed a willingness to abide by the decision of arbitrators to be selected by Mr. Roosevelt (Mitchell's suggestion), yet he was not willing to yield any point in dispute. Failure to accomplish the desired result is the outcome. The situation has grown critical because of the almost total exhaustion of the coal supply in the cities, and what little is left is beyond the reach of all but those in good circumstances. Even the latter will be unable to procure fuel after the last of next week. Fortunately the weather has as yet been moderate, but the results, should the strike continue, will be appalling.

Senator Beveridge says free trade is the mother of trusts. But where is the free trade? And where is the father of the trusts? The trusts alone are on the ground. Perhaps Mr. Beveridge is mistaken and they have "just grown."
