A horsepower is the force required to lift a dead weight of 33,000 pounds one foot a second. To find the horsepower of an engine multiply the area of the piston in inches by the average steam pressure in pounds per square inch. Multiply the product by the travel of the piston in feet per minute and divide that product by 33,000. If an engine is rated at 73 horsepower it will raise 33,000 pounds one foot 73 times in one minute.

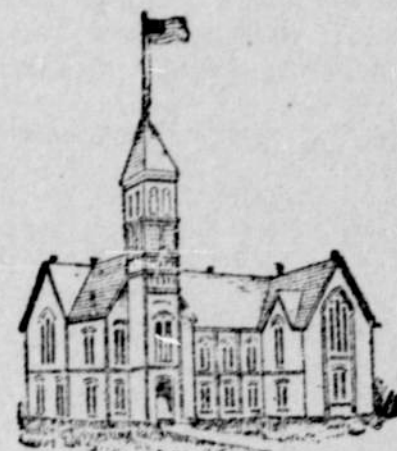
