During the year ending June 30, 1902, there were 14,983 persons appointed to positions in the U. S. Classified Civil Service, which was 4,692 more than ever before appointed in a single year. If you wish information about positions of this kind you can obtain it free by writing for the Civil Service announcement of the Columbian Correspondence College, Washington D. C. The Civil Service Commission will hold examinations to secure young men and women for these places during March and April, at Pendleton and Portland. From 3,046 appointments during the first year of Mr. McKinley's administration, they have increased to nearly five times that number. President Roosevelt is a firm believer in the merit system, and as long as he is president these appointments will continue to increase.

A Philadelphia firm, according to a Press despatch from that city, has received an order from the Japanese government for several X-ray machines, which are to be used for a novel purpose. The firm sometime ago sold to a representative of the Mikado an X-ray machine, which the Japanese explained, was to be used in the government mints in Japan for the detection of dishonest employees who stole coins by swallowing them. The machine was used to examine the suspects as they left the mint daily and of course, it revealed the presence of any coins "in their midst." The test was so satisfactory that the Mikado ordered several more machines, hoping to prevent the form of theft referred to.
