AFTER STOLEN HORSES.

Claimed to be in a Bunch Coming From Harney County.

Long Creek Light: Early this week two men from Lone Rock, whose names we did not learn, came to town looking for six head of horses said to have been stolen from Andy Neal's pasture, near Lone Rock, about a month ago. They were supposed to have been in the bunch of horses that passed through town about two weeks ago, which was claimed to have come from Harney county and going to Washington. The gentlemen from Lone Rock say that a bunch from that place met the Harney bunch in Fox valley and the men returned to Lone Rock, turning their horses over to the men from the south. The trail was picked up at this place and followed north. We have not learned whether they have located the horses yet or not.

SELECTIONS UNDER CAREY ACT.

Deschutes List Rejected—Others in Various Stages of Advancement.

A Washington dispatch to the Oregonian of the 9th says: Representative Moody has been for several days urging the Interior Department to take action on Oregon State selections under the Carey act, so that work on approved projects may be commenced at the earliest practicable date. He learned that list 11, embracing 68,000 acres in the Deschutes Valley, for which the Oregon Development Company has made application, has been examined by an inspector, and reported to be classed as forest land, hence not subject to entry under the Carey act. The land officers at The Dalles have been instructed to allow the state 30 days in which to show cause why this application should not be rejected.

Mr. Moody is advised that a number of other state selections are in various stages of advancement, and will be disposed of as rapidly as reached in regular order.
