Petitions for the referendum on the appropriation for the Lewis and Clark Centennial which is to be held in Portland in 1905, were received in Burns this week. There is small likelihood of their receiving much attention here. Though one of the farthest counties from the site of the proposed exposition, the people recognize the benefits it will bring to Oregon and indirectly to this section. Should the matter be referred to a vote of the people it will undoubtedly succeed and the delay the referendum would occasion should be avoided.

Southeastern Oregon Artesian Basins.

The following regarding artesian basins in southeastern Oregon is taken from the preliminary report on the subject, now in press, by Prof. I. C. Russell of the United States Geological Survey.

In the report three artesian basins are noted in this part of the state: "the Otis artesian basin, in Otis valley, about 6 miles north of Drewsey; the Harney artesian basin, in the broad valley in which lie Malheur and Harney lakes; and the Whitehorse artesian basin, situated about 10 miles east of the higher portion of Stein Mountain.

"Otis Valley is a structural basin in which about 1900 acres are now under irrigation, and in which about 10 or 15 square miles of good land are below the probable artesian head suggested by the elevation at which warm springs come to the surface.

"The Harney artesian basin embraces roughly the region drained by streams flowing into Malheur and Harney lakes, and includes perhaps two-thirds of Harney County, the length of the basin north and south being about 135 miles, and its breadth east and west approximately 50 miles. A rough estimate based on the general map of Oregon indicates that the area within which artesian water may be expected in this basin is about 1000 square miles, but this includes Malheur and Harney lakes and the swamps bordering them.

"The Whitehorse artesian basin, containing perhaps 30 square miles of good land, lies east of Stein Mountain. The apparent shape of the rocks beneath the valley and the presence of warm springs seem to warrant a careful test of the artesian conditions of the valley with a reasonable expectation of obtaining flowing water.
