aminers for an examination as to aminers for an examination as to
hie qualification to receive a license ie qualification to receive a license His examination proving unsatis what was intended to be a tempo rary license onlv or a permit to practice for six months in the fo Henrich Volp, haviog passed stisfactory examination in med cine and surgery before the Board Medical Examiners, is hereb he act to regulate the practice medicine in the State of Oregon,
passed by the legislature in February, 1889, to pursue the practice of nedicine in this state under th conditions of aforesaid act, til
December 13, 1891," On Mirl December 13, 1891," On March
30,1895 , Volp presented this cerfificate, with the words and figure thll December 13,1891 " erased, in was recorded. On July 2,1895,
a Yolp filed the certificate in the omah County, and on July 897, secured a certified copy there of, which he filed in the clerk' hice in Harney County. On May plaint to the board, charging Vol with having fraudulently changed
the certificate, and the board gave olp notice through the mail that would be investigated. The board voked the license, and Vol cought this mandamus suit to as a duly licensed physician. He whereupon he appealed. He based his appeal upon two Hententions-first, that the board
being without authority to issue temporary license, and having certified that the licentiate had passed satisfactory examination and ex
crised its authority to license. nust be held to have exercised its powers legally and to have granted
a full license; and, second, that the oard was without jurisdiction to and legal notice had not been erved. Volp admitted making because the board had no right to ssue a temporary license. The Supreme Court holds that he board had no authority to issue temporary license, and that the imple solution is that the boar exceeded its authority in issuing the form of lisense adopted. It ar lieense. Thon of issuing a regu come up to the preceribed stand ard under his examination, and,
acting upon a generous impulse toward him, so that he might ye have an opportunity of qualifying gage in his adopted profession, the gage in his adopted profession, the
