The fire department will give a dance at Locher's Hall next Friday night, April 17, for the purpose of raising funds to build a cistern at the intersection of the streets southwest of the courthouse. As this is a matter of general interest to all the dance should receive liberal patronage.

At the last regular meeting of the Burns fire department it was decided to organize a ladies auxiliary, and a committee was appointed to solicit and aid in its organization. It is hoped that the ladies will join earnestly in the movement and thus create an enthusiasm among the fire "laddies" that has heretofore been lacking.

Easter Sunday this year falls on April 12, somewhat later than last year, March 30. The date of Easter regulates that of all the movable feasts of the year. Thus Ash Wednesday occurred February 25, Passion Sunday, March 29, and Palm Sunday April 5th. Easter Sunday is always the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring equinox.

John Martin who has been circulating a petition to raise funds to pay the expense of stocking Silvie's River with catfish, tells us that the amount has nearly all been subscribed.
