The last report of the Superintendent of the Oregon state insane asylum gives the number of patients in that institution at 1256, of which 880 were males and 376 females.

Three outfits are at work sinking artesian wells near Snake river, west of Caldwell. There are already some eighteen flowing wells in that vicinity. They range in depth from 140 to 1000 feet and the flow is from 25 to 75 inches of water.
