#### MALHEUR TOPOGRAPHIC SURVEY

#### Party is Working From Huntington Towards Prineville.

Ontario, June 23.—A party of Government surveyors, with C. H. Semper in charge, pitched camp in the western part of Ontario today. They are carrying out a line of levels which was begun about three years ago at Portland, extending by The Dalles, Pendleton, LaGrande and down to Huntington. Mr. Semper's party began their work in Huntington. From Ontario they follow the stage route, via Vale, Burns and thence to Prineville and back to The Dalles. Their work is to ascertain the elevations of the country and to prepare topographic maps of the route, establish elevation markers, etc., and is more evidence that the Government means to reclaim much of this sagebrush land and transform it into fertile farming lands by supplying water.

The donors to the fund were: Harney County, \$250; city council \$50; Masonic Lodge, \$50; Eastern Star, \$30; A. O. U. W. \$50; Odd Fellows, \$50; Rebeccas, \$20; three Ps, \$25.

Late news from Heppner places the loss of life at that place at 250. Work of searching for the dead still continue. 177 bodies being recovered to date. Money is being sent from all parts of the United States to care for the needy and assist in the search for the missing. A number of persons thought to have been drowned at first have turned up alive and well.

Paul DeLaney and E. A. Puterbaugh, the Portland Daily Journal representatives returned to Burns Wednesday from a trip to the eastern part of the county. Mr. DeLaney says that they will spend the Fourth in the picturesque Alvord section, one of the scenes in his "Lord of the Desert," a serial which ran in a large number of Eastern Oregon papers last winter and which he is now having printed in book form.
