George Rex Hixson July 7, 1923 – April 5, 2015

PENDLETON - George Rex Hixson, 91, formerly of Long Creek, died on April 5, shortly after a diagnosis of pancreatic

Mr. Hixson was born July 7, 1923, in Simla, Colo., to B. Rex Hixson and Edith V. Hixson.

In his early years, he rode a horse to school each day. He attended schools in Simla, Limon and Ordway, Colo., where he was active in football, basketball, FFA

and choir. It was in Ordway where he met and married his high

school sweetheart, Evelyn (Meyers) Hixson, on July 30, 1944. He attended Colorado State University where he was a mem-

ber of Alpha Gamma Rho. When World War II started, he returned home to work on the ranch.

He worked with livestock his entire life. He ran sheep from the wheat fields of Kansas to the mountains of Colorado.

In 1964 the family cattle ranch in Ordway was sold, and in 1968, he moved his family to Long Creek to raise cattle.

The start of his roping cattle business began with a Watusi bull that came from Africa who crossed with Long Horn cows. He had an eye for a good horse. Roping was a passion for him, in addition to a lifestyle. He started in rodeo competitions at a young age and continued to rope until he was 87.

At the 2010 American Cowboy Team Roping Association National Finals, with a tip of his hat, he made his final roping run with his son, Bret. There was not a dry eye in the house.

He holds honorary FFA degrees in Colorado and Oregon, and was a 4-H leader and a cattle judge in Colorado. He received numerous awards and championships for his cattle, mules and horses. One accomplishment of which he was proud was the breaking and exhibition of the Baker Livestock hitch of 20 white miniature mules. He wrote a book about that experience.

In 2000, he and his wife moved to Pendleton. He enjoyed roping, the Professional Bull Riders and the Pendleton Round-Up.

Throughout his life, he fostered the love of horses, livestock and rodeo to all who met him. He took great interest in the development of young people and their interest in rodeo.

Survivors include his wife of 70 years, Evelyn; sons, Monty (Jeannine) Hixson of Pendleton, and Bret (Sue) Hixson of Corvallis; and granddaughter, Kathryn.

He was preceded in death by an older sister, Marvel; and younger brothers, Merle and Calvin.

Mr. Hornbeck was born March 4, 1939, in Kingfisher, Okla., to Jesse and Lola Hornbeck. At age 13, he quit school to help provide for his mom and younger siblings, following his father's

death in a car accident in Las Vegas, where they were living. In 1957, while working as a gas station attendant, he met his future wife, Delcie Marie Russom. On Sept. 14,1959, they mar-

ried in Las Vegas. In November 1962, the family moved to Henderson, Nev., where he joined the Henderson Fire Department, achieving the rank of lieutenant.

In 1966, he and his brother, Stanley, planned to move their

families to Alaska. On the way, they worked at mills and ended up in Albany, where he worked at a lumber mill for six months, and then for the Albany Fire Department.

In 1977, the family moved to Redmond, where he was a firefighter/EMS trainer and coordinator for Central Oregon firefighters. He began working as a paid firefighter and was vital in training the first female firefighters to work in the Redmond Fire Department. In 1985, he was awarded Firefighter of the Year.

He also worked with the Boy Scouts through the LDS Church. Mr. Hornbeck loved hunting, fishing, boating, camping, shooting and anything to do with nature. He was known as a great camp cook, and cooked large meals for civic/church groups and

was a designated fire house cook at all the fire stations he served. He was known to have a great sense of humor, but most of all he enjoyed being with family.

After 36 years of service as volunteer and paid firefighter, he retired in 1991. He and his wife moved to Seneca, where he was a fire and ambulance volunteer. The couple opened a café with the help of their two younger sons. He also volunteered cooking for the annual Oyster Feed.

He was instrumental in planning and building the Bear Valley Golf Course and gun club in Seneca.

In 2007, they moved to Heppner, where he worked with the local high school FFA, was active in the community and in the LDS Church.

In November 2014, after his cancer diagnosis, he moved closer to his oldest son, Robert, in Burns.

Survivors include his wife, Delcie Marie Hornbeck, of Heppner; sons, Robert Ell (Penny) of Burns; Jessie Maurice (Patricia) of Redmond and James Stanley (Bobbi) of Prineville; nine grandchildren; seven great-grandchildren; eight nephews; five nieces; brothers, Lloyd and Douglas; and sister, Colleen.


