Porter finished the season with a .240 batting average with two walks, 22 singles, seven doubles, one triple and

He knocked in 13 RBIs and scored 15 runs.

On defense, Porter recorded 55 putouts, 105 assists, five double plays and a fielding percentage of .941.

Ackerman had a .241 batting average, recording 27 hits, four doubles, 22 runs, 12 RBIs and 13 walks.

On defense, he had 79 putouts and two assists with a fielding percentage of .988.

During his 11 starts as Dieter-Knieriem pitcher, struck out 38 batters in 55.2 innings and finished the year with an ERA (earned runs allowed) of 4.20.
