Susan E. Newstetter was born to Robert Leon (Bud) and Bonnie Jean (Jean) Newstetter in Burbank, California. She grew up in Van Nuys, California, where she attended Robert Fulton Junior High and graduated in 1972 from Van Nuys High School.

Sue worked her way up from cleaning toilets and servicing campgrounds to

Sue met and married her first husband, Greg McGranahan, while at Burnt Range on June 3 1978. They divorced in 1984. She moved to Baker City, Oregon, in 1986, where she met her current husband, John La Liberte, in 1989. Sue quit her secure federal job in 1990 and ventured into the uncertain world of private surveying with the firm
Ferguson Surveying and Engineering. She had become friends with Doug Ferguson while she inspected Forest Service Ferguson Surveying and Engineering. She had become friends with Doug Ferguson while she inspected Forest Service
cadastral survey contracts, so she moved to Mount Vernon, Oregon, to run Doug's survey program. John stayed briefly in Baker City but quickly moved to Mount Vernon the next year after Sue endured a cold winter in a 13 foot trailer in RV park in John Day. buying antiques, most of which ended up as lawn art. John and Sue were married on July 21 st 1994 Sue was elected mayor of Mount Vernon in 1994 when the water system failed and she found pollywogs in her bathtub. While mayor, she resolved the decades old water shortage problem by installing a new city water system. She resigned after only one term and started her new career helping cities solve infrastructure problems. Her business, Eastern Oregon Professional Services (EOPS), flourished over the next 2 decades and she made an impact on dozens of communities throughout Eastern Oregon by updating community halls, city infrastructures, and county services. Project she was most proud of include updating the Lake Creek Youth Camp, promoting Grant County through the Healthy Forest Now videos and Forest For All book series, and the Healthy Smiles Dental Clinic. She participated in Journey Through Time, Cinnabar Mountain Rendezvous, Mount Vernon Promoters, Grant County Library Foundation, John Day Community Garden, GREAT, and many fund raisers and charity events.
Sue was one of the first woman land surveyors in the state of Oregon. She was Land Surveyor of the Year, president of the Blue Mountain Surveyors Chapter four times, Chairman of the State Surveyors Board, Oregon Institute of Technology Survey board member, PLSO scholarship board member and was on the OSBEELS board 7 years and serv as president her last year. She participated in all these organizations to improve the survey profession throughout the state and was a role model and mentor to surveyors across Oregon and at the national level.
Sue is survived by her husband, John La Liberte and her mother, Jean Newstetter. She will be missed by countless friends and everyone who shared her love of Dutch oven and solar cooking, Tear Drop camping, fishing, gardening, reading, crafting and the color lime green.
