Seniors put pressure on CPR dummies

JOHN DAY – Lifesaving was on the menu at the John Day Senior Center last month.

A crowd of seniors turned out a half-hour early for the June 18 lunch to learn an easy technique for cardiopulmonary resuscitation and also get basic training on the center's new automated external defibrillator, or AED.

Blue Mountain Hospital ambulance services director Kara Kohfield and several other EMTS were on hand to present the AED as a gift to the center. The device is one of five the crew is deploying in the county, including one to Hospice, one to the Blue Mountain Care Center, and two to local law enforcement.

Kohfield said hospital emergency services funds paid for the devices, which

can be used by lay people for early defibrillation when someone suffers heart failure. Several people stepped up to try attaching the AED to a cardiac dummy. While that may seem intimidating to some, Kohfield noted that

in the event of an emergency, 911 dispatchers can talk people through the process.

Kohfield and crew also presented a video and instructions on "hands-only CPR" – the latest procedure to encourage bystanders to try the lifesaving

procedure. Hands-only CPR was designed as a simple but effective way for bystanders to offer aid while the ambulance is on the way.

The video gave the steps: Call 911 first – then lace the fingers of one hand over the top of the other, and begin pressing hard on the victim's chest with the base of the palms applying pressure. There's no mouth-tomouth or other steps that tended to intimidate people in the past.

People were afraid of doing the full CPR wrong, the video noted, "but any CPR is better than no CPR."

The idea, Kohfield said, is that we can all help each other – and it can make a big difference

"For every one minute we don't do CPR, that person loses 10 percent survivability," she said. "So anything you can do is a help to that person."


He was preceded in death by two sisters and seven brothers.


