According to organizer Linda McCumber, about 300 people attended – one of the largest turnouts they've ever had.

McCumber, who has been on the reunion committee from the start, said they began planning reunions soon after the last class graduated in 1991, and have been holding them every five years for about the past 20 years.

The Saturday picnic was only one of the happenings from a full schedule of activities which filled the three day weekend.

What a great weekend for the city and alumni with gorgeous weather – perfect in the green Long Creek Valley.


