Recipe for left over turkey af-

ter Thanksgiving by Julie Smith: Turkey Tetrazzini

OUT OF THE PAST

- 4 cups cooked spaghetti
- (about one-half pound) 1/4 tsb. nutmeg
- 3 T. dry sherry
- Salt to taste 2 T. butter
- 1 C. sliced mushrooms 8 or more slices cooked turkey
- 1/2 C. freshly grated Romano or Parmesan cheese
- 1 recipe Veloute Sauce* (see recipe below)

*Veloute Sauce is another basic sauce that is creamy with a background taste of well flavored broth.

- 2 T. butter
- 3 T. flour
- 1 C. chicken broth 1/3 C. cream cheese
- Salt to taste

Melt butter in heavy-bottomed pan. Stir in the flour and blend over moderate heat until smooth. Continue cooking, stirring constantly, for 2 minutes.

Add chicken broth, continue to stir as sauce thickens. Bring to a boil. Lower the heat and cook 2 minutes more. Pour in the cream, add salt and heat thoroughly.

Turkey Tetrazzini

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Butter a 2-quart shallow baking dish and spread the cooked spaghetti in it. Stir in the nutmeg, sherry and salt into warm veloute sauce and set aside. Melt the butter in skillet, add mushrooms and cook, stirring until soft. Spoon half of the sauce mixture over the spaghetti. Place the turkey slices and mushrooms on
