time and slice up assorted fresh vegetables too. Then pop it into the microwave until warm and serve with crackers too!

1 8-oz pkg. cream cheese
1 Tbsp. milk
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

2 Tbsp. chopped green onions
dash of freshly ground pepper

Unwrap cream cheese and place in 1 1/2-quart microwave bowl. Microwave on low for 1 1/2 to 2 minutes. Add milk, Worcestershire,

green onion and pepper. Beat with electric mixer on medium speed until well blended. Stir in:

1/4 cup bottled seafood cocktail sauce
1 can rinsed and drained tiny shrimp

1/4 cup chopped green pepper

Spoon into microwave safe pie plate, covering with vented plastic wrap. Microwave on medium for 3 to 3 1/2 minutes, stirring twice during cooking time. Garnish with snipped parsley if desired.
