Student athlete drug testing on table at Grant Union

Issue to be voted on at June 8 board meeting

CANYON CITY — Drug testing for student athletes has been a topic of discussion at Grant Union Junior-Senior High School.

The school does not currently use drug testing, but it may be implemented next school year.

The topic will be discussed and voted on at the 7 p.m. Wednesday, June 8, Grant School District No. 3 school board meeting at the district office at 401 N. Canyon City Blvd.

According to minutes of the April 20 school board

meeting, held at Seneca School, Grant Union principal Ryan Gerry said the intent of drug testing would be to help students and provide them an opportunity to say no to drugs, rather than trying to catch kids using drugs.

He stated the testing would be random, and performed either weekly or bi-weekly.

The types of drugs to be tested would be defined by policy.

Board member Gordon Larson said he would like to know what happens to the data once it's collected, and how it would be protected, so it doesn't have consequences for the students beyond its intent.

Gerry said the same protocol as the current penalty process would be followed.

Board member Chris Cronin said she was interested to see how drug testing of student athletes is working at Prairie City School.

A meeting on the issue was held at the school for parents the evening of Monday, May 16, with seven people in attendance.

Parents were notified of the meeting through an automated phone message, the reader board at the school and the school's online calendar.

"This is a great subject to debate, and both sides have a good argument as to why drug testing should or shouldn't be facilitated," Shelley said.

He said a discussion and vote on whether it should be implemented for fall 2016 will take place at the June 8 meeting.

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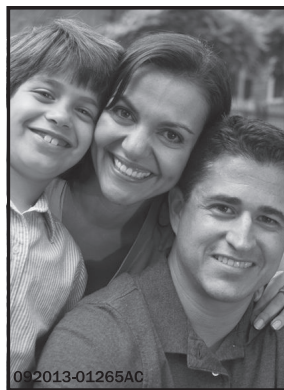
Membership in the Cinnabar Mountain Playdays is required — \$30 each or \$45 for a family — and must be paid in full to participate.

There is also a \$2 entry fee for each event, or \$10 for the day.

Proof of age is required (birth certificate, driver's license or immunization record) and must be presented to the director no later than the second Playday attended by the membership holder.

Contestants must compete in at least four Playdays to be eligible for the year-end awards.

Justice said Thunell was his PE and weight room teacher when he attended high school.

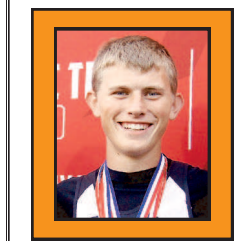
"Art's a good guy," he said.
