

# Snowmobile racers compete in Seneca

Racers and spectators braved frigid temperatures and a blizzard to take part in the Seneca Winter Classic, a weekend-long event hosted by the Grant County Snow-

Twenty-one snowmobilers competed in drag races on Saturday, and nine competed in oval races on Sunday. Racers entered classes dictated by engine size and modifications to the snowmobiles.
