

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Western juniper are a predominant vegetation cover in eastern Oregon and southern Idaho. In the last 140+ years, juniper has increased 10 fold by encroaching into sagebrush ecosystems. This juniper expansion has mostly occurred in semi-arid areas, where small changes in the ecosystem water budget can have large impacts on water availability to forbs and grasses as well as reducing downstream water resources.

Hydrologist Ryan Niemeyer will discuss his doctoral research that focused on "tree-level" and "large-scale" impacts of how juniper alters the ecosystem water budget. He will present some useful resources and tools to help better understand these impacts, including a hydrology website to provide easily accessible information to stakeholders. He has also developed an interactive map where individuals can zoom in to areas of interest to discover potential changes in water resources with shifts in juniper land cover.
