the soft pinks and pastels of the homes of DeLong's parents and grandparents, nostalgia plays a main role in this series of work."

She has a bachelor's in fine art and business from Eastern Oregon University. Her works, exhibited in the Main Gallery, are created with acrylic paint and paper.

"As a kid, paper was widely accessible and had ties to handwritten notes, letters, the calendar my mom wrote all of our activities on — the documents of our lives," DeLong said. "It also, of course, has a resemblance to wall paper."
