Participants will compile a class resource bank of chosen maps, engage with them via writing prompts and discussion, and develop an original piece



of writing that dialogues with a map of their choice. This workshop is suitable for published authors, practicing students, writers who simply dabble and "all thinkers interested in exploring nonfiction's literary-cartographic lay of the land."

Cook is the author of "Leavetakings," a lyric essay collection (University of Alaska Press, 2020). She is a former Fulbright Fellow, an Alaska Literary Award recipient and a Rasmuson Foundation awardee. She holds a PhD in English and creative writing from the University of Missouri.
