
Talk centers on America's master park maker



Historian Laurence Cotton will share his research on the man who designed 700 public parks.

A lecture on Frederick Law Olmsted, a man who designed more than 700 public parks across the United States and Canada, is set for 1 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 15, in the Netul River Room of Fort Clatsop's visitor center.

Historian and film producer Laurence Cotton will give the free lecture, which is part of the park's "In Their Footsteps" series.

Olmsted is sometimes referred to as "America's master park maker." He, along with his two sons and their Olmsted Brothers landscape architecture firm, are credited with building or designing Central Park in New York City, the White House grounds and the entire park systems of Portland, Seattle and Spokane.


Cotton spearheaded a 2014 PBS special on Olmsted, which will be shown at the lecture.

Cotton serves as "Riverlorian" -- historian/naturalist and guide -- on board the American Empress stern-wheeler that plies the Columbia and Snake rivers for history-oriented cruises.
