### Soldier dies during Camp Rilea training

A soldier from Joint Base Lewis-McChord died at Columbia Memorial Hospital after he was shot at Camp Rilea.

"It's still under investigation. What we don't want to do is get ahead of that," said Capt. Mark Miranda of the Washington state Army base's public affairs office.

Spc. Devin James Kuhn, 24, was found with a gunshot wound about 6:30 p.m. Jan. 31 in Rilea's housing area. He was taken to the hospital, where he was pronounced dead by doctors in the emergency room.

"Training in the 75th Ranger Regiment is inherently dangerous, and deaths in training are not unheard of," according to the Army Times. "Several have died from training jumps, among other causes."

Kuhn was assigned to the regiment's A Company, Second Battalion, which had come to Camp Rilea for training. Camp Rilea is the primary training facility for the Oregon National Guard and is also used by Army Special Forces and various police agencies.

While circumstances that led to the shooting haven't been released, the gunshot was accidental and related to the training, the Clatsop County Sheriff's Office reported in its initial media release.

Kuhn, who is from Philadelphia, is survived by his wife and parents.

He enlisted in April 2015 and had earned the National Defense Service Ribbon, Army Service Ribbon, the Expert Infantryman's Badge, the Parachutist Badge and the Ranger Tab.

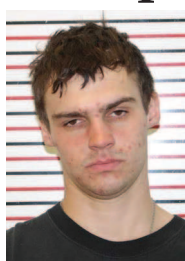
### Prolific car prowler pleads guilty, gets 2 years in prison

A man suspected of committing dozens of vehicle break-ins last fall pleaded guilty Feb. 1 to burglary, first-degree theft and second-degree theft.

Randy Allen Stackhouse, 20, of Warrenton has been in custody since November, when he was arrested on two drug-related warrants.

Police suspected him of the car

burglaries and began collecting evidence, including more than 100 items found in his possession that appeared to be taken during more than 20 vehicle prowls.

Those included sunglasses, lighters, articles of clothing and more.

At the time, police issued a statement seeking people who'd lost property to come to the station to see if any items matched.

Officers continued investigating and made connections between the recovered property and the numerous vehicle break-ins that had been reported.

Evidence was turned over to the Clatsop County District Attorney's Office, which filed charges.

In exchange for the guilty plea, 14 additional charges against Stackhouse were dropped.

He was sentenced to 24 months in prison.
